

Balenciaga: Master of Couture



The McCord Museum presents "Balenciaga, Master of Couture," a major fashion exhibition organized by the Victoria and Albert Museum of London, and a North American premiere.

Revered by his contemporaries and future fashion designers alike, Cristóbal Balenciaga, from the Basque Country (Spain), represented the pinnacle of haute couture in the 1950s and 1960s. His craftsmanship, pioneering use of fabrics and innovative cutting, set the tone for the modernity of late 20th century fashion.

Balenciaga revolutionized the concept of dressing and the female silhouette. For him, perfection was an obligation and his extraordinary technical skils facilitated the task. As a result of his innovative personality, he sought greater simplicity and purity of forms. He was hailed by fashion designer Coco Chanel as the only true couturier amongst us, able to design, cut, assemble and sew a dress entirely by himself.

Discover the creations, the exceptional skill and the legacy of Balenciaga through this major fashion exhibition.
